For many service members, the only hospital clothing available is a hospital gown, which can be impractical for optimum recovery. By creating custom adaptive clothing, the hope is to make the recovery of these injured heroes more comfortable both physically and emotionally.

The clothing gives the service members the ability to have ready access to their injuries by utilizing the adaptive openings in the clothing that ease their exams and physical therapy. This clothing allows injured service members to easily dress themselves, and their clothing appears as normal as civilian attire.

Without the dedication and effort of the volunteer seamstresses who make the adaptive clothing, none of this would happen. We are so proud to have a Southwest Family Member who volunteers for this worthy cause.

She asks that the shirts and boxers be left in the store's packaging or at least leave the tags on. She will take these items and sew/modify them to meet soldiers special needs.

The program's objective is to provide "adaptive clothing for soldiers to wear during their recuperation process. Though modern medical technology is having great success in helping put these soldiers back together, medicine doesn't address some of their basic needs. Needs that include clothing that will accommodate medical devices and situation, like braces, casts, prosthetics and serious burns.

Sewing this adaptive clothing will be an ongoing effort by volunteers around the U.S.
